Celebrating Easter ... at sunrise

On the 1st April this year I will be getting up early, and I mean really early, to lead a service at 5:30 AM at Ashingdon. And it won't just be me; others from St Nicholas will be going too. It's one of the joys (yes I did say 'joys') of helping out a church, which at the moment doesn't have a vicar.

Why would I do that? I am useless in a morning and hate getting up early. What makes this worth the effort?

No, this is not an early April Fool, it's Easter.

Easter Sunday comes at the end of Holy Week. During this week, about 2,000 years ago, Jesus went from hero on Palm Sunday to zero on Good Friday. On Palm Sunday (25th March this year) the crowds in Jerusalem welcomed Jesus as a revolutionary leader. They expected him to overthrow the Roman force of occupation along with their puppet government. During the week it became increasingly clear that Jesus had no intention of leading a revolution, at least not that sort of revolution. On the Thursday evening he had a meal with his friends and he told them he would be arrested and executed. That meal was to become his friends' way of remembering what he was about to do.

2,000 years later, we still remember that meal every Sunday in our services of Holy Communion. Another name for the service is Eucharist, a word that comes from the Greek for 'Thank you'. We say 'thank-you' to God for the revolution that Jesus did in fact lead.

His was a revolution against all that tears the world apart; the greed, selfishness, and hatred that one way or another lies behind so much that goes wrong. It touches everything, our friendships and families right through to international politics and wars.

We see it in so many ways. I have met some people who are so worn down that literally they just want to die, it is colossally sad. In a real sense it is death before death.

On the other hand there are people who have experienced Jesus' revolution. They have a deep hope that seems unbreakable no matter what life throws at them. Even at the point of death they know that life is good and they live it to the last moment. But they also know deep down that the 'last moment' is just a step into another wonderful way of living.

It's all there in the story of Jesus' last week. Betrayed and let down, arrested on false charges, tortured and finally executed. At times he was so terrified he almost gave in. Eventually he died, executed on a cross. Everybody thought that that was the end. The end of Jesus, the end of the revolution that he started, the end of the hope that good would overcome all that is evil.

But then, as the sun rose on the Sunday morning, a few women went to Jesus' grave to cry and prepare for the funeral. But what they found changed the world. Death was not the end. Jesus was alive and the hope that he had offered and talked about was real.

So yes, I will be getting up for a sun rise service on Easter Sunday morning. I want to be there with those women and remember the excitement that they shared. I want to say a big 'Thank You' to God for the revolution that Jesus led. After a week remembering all the crap that life can throw at one person it makes sense to put some effort into celebrating the reality that evil can't ultimately win. That life conquers death. That love overcomes hate. That God offers each and every one of us life that is even stronger than death.

And, after that, another vital part of the celebration; there will be a fantastic full-English breakfast to follow the service! Thank you in advance to the good people of St Andrew's Ashingdon for your generous hospitality!

Dear Friends

5th January 1912

Welcome to 2018! I would like to take this opportunity (albeit late) to wish you all a very Happy New Year and all the best for 2018.

Since coming back to school, we have been very busy. The week started for staff with a training day on Restorative Justice. Restorative Justice is a very powerful tool that is used in many organisations as a way to encourage responsibility for our own actions and to repair any damage done by them. It is something that we will be introducing across the school and hope that this will add to the life skills that we aim to give our pupils as they move through our school and into the next stages of their lives.

We have continued to embed Growth Mindset and it is always lovely to see the children using the powerful learning principles associated with Growth Mindset. The pupils are very clear about the power of “yet.” They have often been overheard, when speaking to each other, quoting Sheila Tobias; “There is a difference between not knowing and not knowing yet.” Growth Mindset links very well with Restorative Justice.

We have continued over the past few weeks and will continue to embed the children’s knowledge and understanding of the Fundamental British Values. We were all amazed about how well the children could explain what the values mean and how they could relate them to everyday life. They thoroughly enjoyed learning about the history of the values and how important they are in everyday life.

Our Accelerated Reader initiative has continued to have a dramatic impact on reading outcomes and reading ages. Just to give you an idea of the impact of this system, our pupils have made an average of 6.1 months progress in their reading ages in 6 weeks! We are obviously really proud of all of the children who have worked so hard to engage with the system. We are also very thankful to all of the staff who have implemented the programme and the parents/carers to work with their children to help them. We believe that reading is a key skill that will enable our pupils to flourish in an ever changing world. It is a skill that we work tirelessly to help them develop.

Christmas week was, as ever, fantastic and the learning undertaken by the pupils was of a very high quality. The use of the stories/books to stimulate learning about this important time of the year helped the children make connections between the events as detailed in the different Gospels to modern values and life. The work completed by our pupils was, as ever, of a really high quality.

Finally, I would like to share something one of the children said to me during our Collective Worship this week. Having spent some time discussing new challenges and changes and how adults make changes and resolutions in the New Year, one child said something that made me stop and think. He told me that often people make resolutions that take things away. He thought it was more important to add to our lives in order to make them better. It was much easier to keep to “promises that we add to than it is to keep to promises that take away.” I asked for an example and he told me he had decided to make people feel good by smiling at somebody new every day! What a lovely idea!

Thank you for your continued support of our wonderful school and for helping us on our continuing journey. We really value everything that you do.

St. Nicholas Church's Pipe Organ

The Church pipe organ was built in London around 1865. It predates the existing church building which is 135 years old having been built on the site of a church constructed in 1823 and later demolished. The organ is of historic importance being one of the smallest pipe organs in Essex with the tiniest pedalboard.

The organ has been regularly maintained, but over recent years the instrument has shown signs of being in need of a major overhaul. This course of action was recommended to the Parochial Church Council (PCC) by Martin Cross who had maintained it annually for 20 years. The cost of the work was £7440, a huge amount for a small congregation to raise, but the organ was felt to be such an integral and important part of the fabric of St. Nicholas Church the decision to go ahead was taken by the PCC.

The Organ Concert to be held on Saturday 17 March at 7pm is a celebration of the completion of the refurbishment project. The whole cost has been raised by donations, fundraising and receipt of grants from Rawreth Parish Council, 'All Churches Trust', 'On Organ Fund' and 'Henry E. Bass Fund'. St. Nicholas Church is very grateful to everyone who contributed in any way to the project. All are invited to come along on 17 March to this special free concert to hear the church organ being played by invited organists.

Rochford Neighbourhood Watch

Essex Police received reports of persons going from door to door in the Benfleet / Hadleigh area, trying to sell goods to the occupants. These persons will normally inform the occupant that they have just come out of prison or on probation and they are trying to turn their lives around. This is a scam, the goods they have on them are usually of an inferior quality, they may try to talk their way into your address. We have had reports of them being intimidating towards the elderly and vulnerable, when they don't get their own way they often revert to abuse and threats. In short these are not bonafide street traders. They are often referred to as 'Nottingham Knockers', from where the scam originated. They work in gangs, will arrive in an area on a mini bus and carry out their illegal activity in one area at a time. Both Castle Point and Rochford have both been targeted recently.

To sell door to door, it is a legal requirement to hold a pedlars licence. There are strict rules around obtaining a pedlars licence, they can be obtained by applying to the Police:

Section 4 Pedlars Act 1871 requires an individual carrying out the business as a Pedlar to obtain a certificate granted by the Chief Officer of Police for the district in which the pedlar resides for one month prior to the making application.

The Chief Constable will grant the certificate on being satisfied that the applicant:

- Is over 17 years of age;
- Is a person of good character;
- Intends in good faith to carry on the trade of a pedlar.

The certificate, which is valid for one year from the date of issue, will authorise the holder to act as a pedlar anywhere in the UK.

Any person using an expired certificate should be treated as a person acting without a certificate.

If you work as a pedlar without a certificate – or you let someone else use yours – you could be fined up to £200

You could also get a prison sentence of up to 6 months if you either:

1. give false information when you apply
2. make or carry a forged certificate

So, if they do not hold a certificate that has been duly authorised by the Police, it looks fake, belongs to another person, or it is simply out of date then do not buy from them. They will also state that they do not need a pedlar certificate or 'hawkers' licence to

- Politely refuse to buy from them and close the door. Do not get involved in any verbal altercation with them.
- Do not let them into your address for any reason and never give out any personal information.
- Call us on 101 (999 in an emergency) if you are subjected to verbal abuse or intimidation, or simply to let us know they are in the area.
